One day a lady came into the exam room after a long day of waiting to be seen. There was a "quiet desperation" in her eyes. She was sitting on the edge of the exam table, leaning forward and pleading without uttering a sound.

"I've lost everything," she said — family, her home in Portau-Prince as well as almost all of her earthly goods. And yet in a pleasant tone, she asked if there was anything we could do for

I said yes, there was, and immediately called Pastor Delamy to see if he could talk with her. Despite all of the demands of his time he came quickly and, while holding her hand, he said in a very calm and reassuring voice said that yes, the clinic would be able to provide her some food, shelter and clothes.

I will never forget her response. With tears in her eyes, she grabbed Delamy's hand and thanked him profusely.

intact and no one was injured.

But the emotional impact of the January 12 quake was very real and continues to be felt every day.

One of our partners in Haiti told us, "Port-au-Prince is the center of the country, sort of like our heart is the center of our bodies ... Not one family is untouched by the death and destruction in Port-au-Prince."

A translator working with one of our volunteer doctors described things this way: 99 percent of the country has been affected — either a family member, a friend or a distant relative was killed. Everyone, even in Gonaives, a city in northern Haiti, wakes up at night, thinking they might die at any moment. It's a constant burden to think that your family might be taken away from you in an instant.

Since the earthquake, many people in Port-au-Prince and other hard-hit cities, have moved to other parts of the country. The United Nations estimates that nearly half a million people have fled the capital city. Some of those people have made their way to the rural communities served by Haiti Foundation of Hope in the northern part of the

family in need.

One woman, who lives in Gonaives, told us she has 19 people staying at her home. Sixteen of those people came to her after the earthquake. At another woman's home there are eight people. Three of them came from Port-au-Prince. A man told us five people moved into his home after the quake, making it now 11 people under his roof.

There are other struggles as well. Food has been a constant problem for people in Terre Blanche. Crops failed the past two years because of flooding and now drought. And since the quake, the price of food has risen and is expected to become increasingly difficult to find. We are currently giving out food to every patient at the clinic and we continue to give the 850 students at the school a meal each day.

Responding to the Earthquake

THE NEED

People around the world have been watching Haiti since it was struck by a 7.0-magnitude earthquake on the afternoon of January 12.

In the days and weeks since then, the extent of the death and destruction has become clear: crumbled buildings. bodies buried in rubble, medical emergencies, and people without homes, food and clean water.

Most of the damage was in the capital city of Port-au-Prince and nearby towns, however, the effects of the quake have been felt throughout the entire country.

The earthquake has been responsible for more than 200,000 deaths. according to the United Nations. Even more injuries were reported.

As the aftershocks continued, people

were too afraid to stay indoors and moved into tent cities that were quickly set up in open spaces. Others left Port-au-Prince, hoping to find better living elsewhere.

Relief aid provided by outside governments, military personnel and nonprofit organizations has poured into the country while volunteers on the ground have been working to the get the aid into the hands of those in need.

Although many steps have been taken to help the people of Haiti, there is still a tremendous amount of work to do.

OUR RESPONSE

Within days of the earthquake, two of our board members, Dr. Joe and Linda Markee, were on the ground in Port-au-Prince, volunteering at a hospital with a disaster relief team. They moved in February from the capital city to the Clinic of Hope, a medical



In mid-February, a full-scale medical team arrived to spend a week working at the Clinic of Hope. The team had been scheduled to work at the clinic since last year and arrived on the first day that commercial flights resumed travel to Haiti. Another medical team is set to fly into Haiti this month.




We are committed to helping the people of Haiti and to continuing our work there. With your help, we are making a difference.
